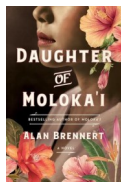

Erdrich, Louise

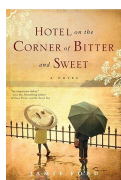
Based on the extraordinary life of the author's grandfather, a night watchman carries the fight against Native dispossession from rural North Dakota all the way to Washington, D.C.

Suzanne Rindell

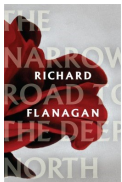
Two young daredevil flyers confront ugly truths and family secrets during the U.S. internment of Japanese citizens during World War II.

Lisa See

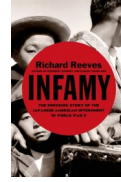

Richard Flanagan

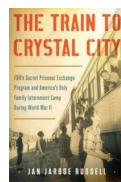

Bill T. Manbo

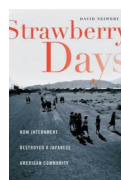

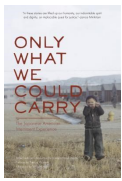


Strawberry Days

The moving tale of a community of Japanese American strawberry farmers during World War II and how they were prevented from reclaiming their land after the war.

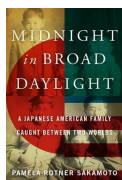

Lawson Fusao Inada

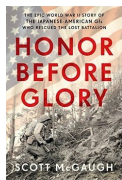
Through personal documents, art, and propaganda, this anthology expresses through words, art, and haunting recollections, the fear, confusion and anger of the camp experience.
